PETITION FOR INTERVENTION

NOW COMES Freedom Partners, LLC d/b/a Freedom Energy and hereby petitions the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission for intervention in the above-captioned proceeding pursuant to RSA 541-A:32 and NH Code Admin. Rule Puc 203.17. In support of its Petition for Intervention, Petitioner says the following:

- 1. Freedom Partners, LLC, inter alia, is a retail broker of Renewable Energy Certificates (REC's) and Verified Greenhouse Gas Emission Reductions (VERs);
- 2. On May 29, 2008, Public Service Company of New Hampshire (PSNH) filed a petition for approval of a Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) and Renewable Energy Certificate (REC) Option Agreement (collectively, the Agreements) between PSNH and Lempster Wind, LLC (Lempster Wind). Pursuant to the terms of the Agreements, PSNH will purchase 100% of the energy, capacity and NH RECs from Lempster Wind, with Lempster Wind having the option to repurchase a certain percentage of the RECs from PSNH at a price that includes a premium above the price originally paid by PSNH.
- 3. As a retail broker of Renewable Energy Certificates (REC's) and Verified Greenhouse Gas Emission Reductions (VERs), Freedom Partners, LLC has rights, duties, privileges, immunities and other substantial interests which may be affected by this proceeding.

WHEREFORE, Freedom Partners, LLC hereby respectfully requests the Commission to grant it party intervener party status and to order such other and further relief as may be just and equitable.

2	Lempster Wind and Renewable Energy Certificate Option
3	Agreement with that party. And, the interventions have
4	come from two parties who also purchase Renewable Energy
5	Certificates and power, and we will be objecting to the
6	intervention of Constellation NewEnergy and Constellation
7	Commodity Services. And, we also were initially going to
8	object to the intervention of Freedom Energy, but Mr.
9	Rodier and I came to an agreement yesterday, which I'll
10	read into the record.
11	CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Well, why don't
12	we regroup then. I thought maybe bifurcating the issues
13	might be helpful, but it sounds like we might not be able
14	to do that. So, why don't you continue with what you're
15	doing and give us your position on the Petitions to
16	Intervene and whatever agreement you may have reached.
17	MR. EATON: That's what I thought you
18	were looking for. I'm sorry.
19	CHAIRMAN GETZ: No, I thought there
20	might be a chance to deal with the case and what the
21	issues in the case were, and then deal with the
22	interventions separately. But never mind.
23	MR. EATON: All right. Mr. Rodier
24	agreed to limit the intervention of Freedom to the

following issues: The issues related to Renewable Energy Certificates and the REC market. He agreed to ask no more than 12 data requests. That Freedom Energy would submit no direct testimony. He'd limit his cross-examination of PSNH witness to no more than 45 minutes. And, Freedom Energy will not seek access to information for which PSNH seeks confidential treatment, unless such information becomes public.

So, between PSNH and Freedom Energy, that position is acceptable to us, and we will not object to the intervention of Freedom Energy. Because they have agreed to limit their intervention, and under RSA 541-A:32, I(b), the -- I'm sorry, from 541-A:32, III, the Commission has the authority to limit the intervention of a party.

With respect to Constellation, we believe that Constellation has not presented facts which show they have a substantial interest in the rights, duties, and privileges, immunities would be affected by this proceeding. They are a competitor for Renewable Energy Certificates. And, they have demonstrated by their objection to PSNH's Motion for Protective Treatment that they want access to the confidential pricing terms and conditions of both the Power Purchase Agreement and the

Request for Approval Under RSA 362-F of a Power Purchase Agreement

1	Q.	Do these Agreements meet the standards listed above?
2	A.	Yes, they do. The first standard requires that the agreement meet the purposes and goals of the
3		chapter in an efficient and cost-effective manner. The goals of the chapter are to promote
4		renewable energy production in New Hampshire. The Agreements will certainly do that, since
5		they support the construction of new renewable generation in New Hampshire that qualifies for
6		New Hampshire RECs. Moreover, the pricing of energy is based upon market prices and the
7		New Hampshire RECs are being obtained at a discount from both the legislatively determined
8		default price and current market prices.
9		The second standard requires that the Agreements be consistent with the restructuring policy
10		principles of RSA 374-F:3. Nothing in the Agreements is in conflict with any of the policy
11		principles contained in that statute.
12		The third standard requires that the Agreements create a reasonable mix of resources in light of
13		the state's energy policy in RSA 378:37 and the utility's integrated least cost resource plan.
14		The Agreements will provide PSNH with its first wind-powered renewable energy source and
15		assist PSNH in meeting the requirements of the Renewable Portfolio Standard (RSA 362-F). In
16		PSNH's Integrated Least Cost Resource Plan filed on September 30, 2007, PSNH discusses the
17		need to enter into longer-term contracts with renewable facilities that produce RECs.
18		The fourth standard discusses the need for procurement of power to be administratively
19		efficient and promoting market-driven competitive solutions. With the approval of these
20		Agreements, PSNH will obtain 24 MW of renewable power representing approximately 10% -
21		15% of PSNH's Class I requirement during 2009 – 2012. These Agreements form a model for
22		future negotiations, thus providing for administrative efficiency. Moreover, since the
23		Agreements have been negotiated with market participants, they are market-driven competitive

The fifth standard requires that the agreements provide economic development and environmental benefits for New Hampshire. The Agreements provide the support to develop this wind project and the renewable energy generated by the Project will reduce PSNH's reliance on fossil-fuel-based market purchases.

to regional air pollution. Finally, addressing RSA 374-F:3, V (e), although I don't view the proposed agreements as representing an "alternative means of providing transition or default services," the pricing terms in the proposed agreements should mitigate price volatility while also not creating new deferred costs, as the costs related to the proposed agreements will be included in PSNH's energy service rate which is periodically reconciled.

- 7 Q. Regarding RSA 362-F:9, II (c), what is the energy policy set forth in RSA 378:37?
- 8 A. RSA 378:37 reads as follows:

378:37 New Hampshire Energy Policy. – The general court declares that it shall be the energy policy of this state to meet the energy needs of the citizens and businesses of the state at the lowest reasonable cost while providing for the reliability and diversity of energy sources; the protection of the safety and health of the citizens, the physical environment of the state, and the future supplies of nonrenewable resources; and consideration of the financial stability of the state's utilities.

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- 17 Q. Do you think the proposed agreements are consistent with that policy?
- A. Yes. Adding a wind facility to PSNH's supply portfolio provides further fuel source diversity as well as a new generation source that has no harmful emissions and does not draw on the supplies of nonrenewable resources. Also, the agreements contain reasonable prices for RECs, energy and capacity that will provide supply to PSNH and its customers at known pricing terms, thereby avoiding potential future supplemental purchases at uncertain pricing terms.

- Q. Where do the pricing terms of the agreements fit in terms of an examination of whether the agreements are substantially consistent with the factors listed in RSA 362-F:9, II (a) (e)?
