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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Good morning,
3	everyone. We'll open the prehearing conference in docket
4	DW 08-088. On June 27, Hampstead Area Water Company filed
5	a petition for authority to borrow long-term debt, to
6	extend its franchise area, and for a step increase in
7	rates. It seeks to borrow \$1,100,885 from the State
8	Revolving Loan Fund to fund the construction of an
9	interconnection between its two core systems in the Towns
10	of Hampstead and Atkinson. Order of notice was issued on
11	July 30 setting the prehearing conference for this
12	morning.
13	I'll note for the record that we have a
14	letter from the Consumer Advocate indicating that it would
15	be participating in the proceeding. We also have the
16	affidavit of publication. And, we have a Petition to
17	Intervene from it looks like two citizens of the Town of
18	Atkinson.
19	So, at this point, can we just take
20	appearances for the record, and then we'll hear a
21	statement of the positions from the parties.
22	MR. LEVINE: Thank you, Commissioner.
23	Attorney Robert Levine, attorney for Hampstead Area Water
24	Company. With me today is Stephen St. Cyr, our

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1 consultant; our Controller, John Sullivan; our Vice
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- 2 President, Christine Lewis Morse; our President Harold
- 3 Morse; and Charlie Lanza from our Engineering Department.
- 4 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Good morning.
- 5 CMSR. MORRISON: Good morning.
- 6 CMSR. BELOW: Good morning.
- 7 CHAIRMAN GETZ: If it's Ms. Grant or Mr.
- 8 Wolters, if you could just identify yourselves for the
- 9 record?
- 10 MR. WOLTERS: Yes. John Wolters and
- 11 Shirley Davis, and she's not on the petition.
- 12 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. And, from the
- 13 Town of Atkinson?
- MR. WOLTERS: Yes.
- 15 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Thank you.
- MS. HOLLENBERG: Good morning again.
- 17 Rorie Hollenberg and Stephen Eckberg, here for the Office
- 18 of Consumer Advocate.
- 19 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Good morning.
- 20 CMSR. MORRISON: Good morning.
- 21 CMSR. BELOW: Good morning.
- MS. THUNBERG: Good morning,
- 23 Commissioners. Marcia Thunberg, on behalf of Staff. And,
- 24 with me today is Mark Naylor, Jim Lenihan, Jayson

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1 LaFlamme, and Doug Brogan and Stu Hodgdon. Thank you.
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- 2 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. And, I don't
- 3 know if you've been advised of the process, but what we'll
- 4 do now is everybody gets a chance to state their position
- on the record. So, Mr. Levine.
- 6 MR. LEVINE: Thank you, Commissioner.
- 7 The Company is requesting authorization to borrow
- 8 \$1,100,885 from the State of New Hampshire State Revolving
- 9 Loan Fund as administered by DES for the interconnection
- 10 with the Hampstead core and the Atkinson core systems.
- 11 We're asking that the Commission find that it would be in
- 12 the public good to have that financing approved, and also
- 13 that the approval of the project for which the financing
- 14 is being requested is also prudent and consistent with the
- public interest. We're asking that the Commission also
- 16 approve a rate increase, a step increase attributable to
- 17 the repayment of the financing as part of this docket, and
- 18 also approve an expansion of our franchise so that we may
- 19 serve customers that will then be in the area that the
- interconnection shall be coursing through.
- 21 As the Commission noted, there was a
- 22 Petition to Intervene, which was filed with the
- 23 Commission, it's dated August 20th. I have a objection
- 24 that I wish to file with the Commission to the Petition

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1 for Intervention. I have provided copies to Mr. Wolters,
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- 2 the OCA, and to Staff.
- 3 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Do you want to
- 4 summarize this objection or do you want to just rest on
- 5 the papers?
- 6 MR. LEVINE: I can summarize it.
- 7 Basically, the issue cited in the Petition to Intervene is
- 8 based on an ordinance that had been passed by the Town of
- 9 Atkinson that prohibits the transport of water outside of
- 10 town boundaries. Our position is that the people who are
- 11 seeking to intervene are neither customers of the water
- 12 company or within the route for the proposed
- 13 interconnection. The Town of Atkinson has not filed any
- 14 appearance in this docket. They're the ones charged with
- 15 the enforcement of the ordinance. We feel that the
- ordinance is not appropriate for the Commission to enforce
- 17 and outside of its jurisdiction as a statutory agency.
- 18 It's more appropriate for the state court to take up the
- validity or the enforcement of such an ordinance.
- 20 We're concerned about the intervenors
- 21 having party status. We feel that it would unduly
- complicate the proceedings. We think that their concerns
- are more appropriately raised as part of public comment,
- 24 as provided in the statute. For all those reasons, we

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1 feel it's within the discretion of the presiding officers
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- 2 to not allow intervention on these issues as part of the
- 3 interconnection proceeding. Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. Mr. Wolters,
- 5 and also if you could clarify, in the Petition to
- 6 Intervene, it says it's "for the Petitioners and
- 7 supporting voters of both Atkinson Special Town Meetings".
- 8 So, I want to clarify, is -- do you have some official
- 9 capacity on behalf of the town or on behalf of other
- 10 individuals, or is this filed basically individually?
- 11 MR. WOLTERS: It was filed individually.
- 12 However, I do have petitions here of 60 individuals when
- 13 we placed this on the docket originally. We also held
- 14 several town meetings in which we invited the entire town.
- 15 And, we had a vote on that particular ordinance, and it
- was approved 70/30. I mean, the Town is really very much
- 17 enthusiastic enforcing that type of the thing, the people
- 18 there. And, the reason I've come today, not that
- intervening is exactly the PUC's, from what I'm hearing,
- 20 it isn't what you're looking for, our concern is that for
- 21 the past six years they have only had a 7,000 gallon a day
- growth, 7,000 gallon a day. They're asking for, by 2010,
- 23 100,000 gallon increase. And, by 2014, a 250,000 gallon a
- 24 day increase. The total amount, from what they're taking

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1 now, plus what they want to take, and 16 percent that
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- 2 they're allowed for waste, comes to 442 million gallons a
- 3 year from this town of 6,600 people. They have wells
- 4 they've drilled up to 840 feet deep. I know of no one in
- 5 the town that has a well near that depth. They have wells
- from 100 to 400 feet. And, as you know, you draw water,
- 7 that type of quantity of water, it's going to -- it could
- 8 lower the level of which you're pumping water out at a lot
- 9 lower than their wells. There's no means in their
- 10 application to cover if people get harmed from their
- 11 drawdown.
- 12 And, we do have an ordinance that asked
- 13 them not to sell water outside. If it's consumed in the
- 14 Town, we don't object to that. But the town people do not
- 15 want the water sold to other towns. And, that is the
- intent of why I'm here. I just happen to be the president
- of a condo association that has 121 voters. And, I have
- 18 numerous petitions that other people have signed here.
- 19 But I'm just a layperson who's interested in the
- 20 community. These people have a money motive, and they're
- 21 not considering the intent of what's in the best interest
- of that community.
- 23 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Do you want to
- 24 respond at all to the objection to your intervention?

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       mentioning, it's involved as to what I put down on the
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       intervention, but there's more to it than that. I could
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       see, because of my lack of experience, I didn't put down
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       enough of like I'm trying to point out now. In their
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       application, as I've already stated, they have only had a
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       growth of 7,000 gallons a day, and yet they're asking for
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       250,000 gallons over the next six and a half, seven years.
       There's an intent beyond the community. Nowhere in that
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       application does it say that "we need it for this road and
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       this road and these people and that people." They want to
       sell it elsewhere. That's exactly what the people there
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       do not want. And, I ask the Commission not to approve
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       their loan for this purpose.
                         CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. Well, if
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       there's any other paperwork that you have that you want to
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       file, make sure that the Clerk gets it before you leave
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       today.
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                         MR. WOLTERS: Okay. Thank you.
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MR. WOLTERS: Well, I think what they're

- 20 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you.
- Ms. Hollenberg.

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- MS. HOLLENBERG: Thank you. I'll be
- 23 brief. The Office of Consumer Advocate has already
- 24 addressed its opposition to the requested rate increase

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1 within this financing docket. And, so, I won't repeat
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- 2 what I've said earlier in the prehearing conference on DW
- 3 08-065. However, I do ask that the Commission take
- 4 administrative notice of those statements. And, I also
- 5 ask that the Commission take administrative notice of a
- 6 statement of the Company in that prehearing conference, in
- 7 response to a question posed by Chairman Getz, that the
- 8 Company will not begin repayment of the SRF loan until the
- 9 later part of 2009.
- 10 Moreover, I would just make the
- 11 statement that we do take no position on the Petition to
- 12 Intervene. Thank you.
- 13 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you.
- Ms. Thunberg.
- MS. THUNBERG: Yes. Thank you,
- 16 Commissioners. And, like OCA, Staff has yet to form a
- 17 position on the Company's petition at this stage of the
- 18 proceeding. But, given that discovery will occur in this
- 19 proceeding, we will offer our position on the petition at
- 20 a later point. Staff is aware that DES is pushing for
- 21 this interconnection, but Staff will come up with its own
- 22 conclusion.
- With respect to the intervention
- 24 request, as presented on the motion, on the Petition to

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1 Intervene, it was Staff's understanding that enforcement
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- 2 of the ordinance or the Commission's assistance in
- 3 breaching the ordinance was the crux of the intervenors'
- 4 argument. And, on that point, Staff does not believe or
- 5 it would be Staff's position that the petitioners have not
- 6 met the requirements of 541-A:32 that the rights, duties,
- 7 and privileges would be impacted by this proceeding. And,
- 8 that is because this ordinance that's attached to the
- 9 petition does have a citizen enforcement clause, and there
- 10 has been no enforcement of this ordinance yet. If that
- 11 were the case, the Company could proceed under 674:30 and
- 12 request the municipality to waive the ordinance. If they
- 13 were unsuccessful there, they could come here and we would
- 14 have a specific docket dealing with the issue of whether
- 15 to waive that, the ordinance that has been attached to the
- 16 petition.
- 17 Now, enforcement is not before this
- 18 Commission, it would be to Superior Court. There is no
- 19 Superior Court action yet. If there were, then Staff
- 20 would concede that there would be rights, duties, and
- 21 privileges that would overlap with the proceeding
- 22 continuing here.
- There's another point I wish to make.
- The ordinance does make state employees, agencies liable

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1 under the ordinance, and Staff is only aware of RSA 541-B
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- 2 as where the Legislature had made a -- had carved out very
- 3 few exceptions to the sovereign immunity clause, where
- 4 state agency employees acting under their employment could
- 5 be subject to liability.
- 6 Having said that objection, in talking
- 7 with the intervenors, it seems, even though they are not
- 8 customers, they are concerned with the development water
- 9 use of the general area. This is a franchise area. I'm
- 10 not sure if they are specifically within the franchise
- 11 area. But, even if they're not, they may be adjacent,
- 12 they may be future customers. And, if the intervenors are
- 13 interested in this docket because of the planning for
- 14 water use in the area, then Staff would concede that they
- do have rights, privileges, and duties and would satisfy
- the intervention of 541-A:32.
- 17 So, our position with respect to the
- 18 intervention is two-fold. One, objection -- objecting
- 19 based on what is written. And, the other concurring with
- 20 the request if it is more or if it's enlarged to concerns
- 21 about water use in the Town of Atkinson where they reside.
- Thank you.
- 23 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. Well, let me
- 24 return to the issue of the Motion to Consolidate, and let

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1 me confirm this with you, Ms. Hollenberg. What I take the
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- OCA's motion is really solely with the issue of the step
- 3 increase, and that your proposal is that the step increase
- 4 be considered in the context of the rate case, is that
- 5 accurate?
- 6 MS. HOLLENBERG: Yes, sir.
- 7 CHAIRMAN GETZ: And, we haven't had the
- 8 opportunity to deliberate this issue. Let me just express
- 9 my personal concerns at this juncture. First, is that the
- 10 notion of a step increase, while a rate proceeding is
- 11 going on, raises questions in my mind about "should we
- 12 being going down two paths?" But, I think, to resolve
- that issue, need to be clear on a question of fact, "then
- 14 what is the DES's requirement in this regard?" And, there
- seems to be different characterizations of a phone call
- and past practice. I think we need to hear something
- 17 directly from DES, something in writing and something with
- 18 some specificity about this particular case and what it
- 19 requires in order to approve the Revolving Fund loan.
- 20 And, I think that's the critical piece before we can make
- 21 a decision about the step increase. So, if we could get
- something in writing from DES, if Staff could reach out or
- 23 Staff and the OCA and the Company, however the parties
- 24 want to proceed on that is up to the parties.

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Is there any other questions in that

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       regard? Any other issues?

                         CHAIRMAN GETZ: Any other issues that
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       the parties want to raise this morning? Mr. Levine.
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                         MR. LEVINE: Just in response to
       Mr. Wolters' statements. Our water usage and the -- what
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       he's referring to is the large groundwater petition that
       is before -- application that is before DES. And, it just
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       again raises a concern as to the orderly proceeding of
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       this particular docket, and without complicating it with
       outside issues. And, it does raise concerns for the
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       Company in just obtaining the relief that we're
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       requesting, as far as the financing goes for this
       interconnection. Those monies with the SRF financing
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       again are rotating and prioritized. And, it is our
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       concern that they be available.
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                         CHAIRMAN GETZ: Thank you. Anything
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       further this morning?
                         (No verbal response)
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                         CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Hearing nothing,
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       then we'll close the prehearing conference and await some
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       kind of formal contact from the Department of
       Environmental Services, and take the matter under
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1	advisement.	Thank you, everyone.
