Are home design choices more important than medication for Alzheimer’s patients?

Two weeks ago, Mary McCreesh got the kind of news that makes your heart sink: Her 82-year-old father was officially diagnosed with Alzheimer’s.

So McCreesh, of Wayne, Pa., spent that Friday afternoon at, of all places, the Philadelphia Home Show. She figured she can’t change her father’s diagnosis, but she can make it easier for him to stay at home, in the house McCreesh grew up in.

“We can see the house through his eyes and find ways to make it easier for him, not knowing what’s ahead.”

She was there for a presentation by Theresa Clement, a designer and aging-in-place specialist from Ambler, Pa., whose own father succumbed to Alzheimer’s disease in September. Clement learned along the way that her line of work was surprisingly relevant to managing certain symptoms of the disease.

“If I had known at the start what I know now, my dad would have been able to live at home with my mom a year or so longer than he did,” Clement said. So, consulting with experts including Dylan Wint, a neurologist and psychiatrist at the Cleveland Clinic, she’s developed what she calls Design Prescription.

“I’m giving people some simple things that are inexpensive to do that can save so much stress, so much time, and make you be able to enjoy your loved ones even as they start to fade away,” she said. “If you’re living with someone with Alzheimer’s, you don’t have time to read all the scholarly research to say, for example, ‘What can I do to stop my loved one from peeing in the trash can?’ So I try to distill it down.”

One in three senior citizens dies with dementia, according to the Alzheimer’s Association.

Neurologists agree home design can help people with dementia age in place. Designer Theresa Clement has made a “design prescription” her mission after her father was diagnosed. She says accommodations don’t have to be hospital-like. During a talk at the Philadelphia Home Show last month, she gave an example of how a grab bar can be disguised as a stylish towel bar.

And it doesn’t affect just memory. Many people with the disease also have challenges perceiving colors, contrasts, depth and organizing visual information.

“The brain takes things the eye sees and executes a wonderfully complicated task of telling us how far one thing is from another and knowing where one thing ends and another begins,” said Jason Karlawish, a professor, physician and associate director of the Penn Memory Center in Philadelphia. “As Alzheimer’s disease affects the part of the brain that organizes visual images, people have a hard time understanding that.”

For some, those are the first symptoms of the disease; others don’t suffer visual-spatial challenges until later. Either way, caretakers can help.

“A lot of the challenges people face with Alzheimer’s disease could perhaps be more easily solved with design choices as opposed to medication,” Wint said.

At the Home Show, Clement pointed out an area rug on the stage.

“This rug is a big trip hazard. This beautiful modern pattern can be an optical illusion,” she said.

Contrasts in flooring, like

a light rug on a dark wood floor, might appear to be an elevation change. A patterned rug might appear as uneven terrain, and small tiles might appear as scattered objects to be picked up. On the flip side, people may have trouble distinguishing actual elevation changes between rooms, or judging the height of a step; in those cases, a ramp might be helpful.

And in the bathroom, the lack of contrast can have messy results.

“The white toilet on a white floor with a white wall — that’s what all the pictures on Houzz show, and it’s a beautiful look,” Clement said. “But for people with Alzheimer’s, it can be hard to see white on white on white. So a hamper is often used, or a trash can.”

Painting a contrasting color behind the toilet can be an easy fix, she said.

Other ideas she learned from her father: Keep essentials in plain sight. “If you take a door off one cabinet and put the plate, bowl, spoon, and cup there, they can see it.”

Also, try to maintain even lighting throughout the day, because changes in lighting can be confusing, and dark shadows can appear as an

abyss. (Although, Karlawish noted, some special-care units use that to their advantage, placing black rugs in front of exits to prevent patients from wandering away.)

Wint, who is collaborating with the University of Nevada-Las Vegas’ architecture program on a new health care interior-design program, said research on the issue so far is scarce. For now, much of his advice to caregivers is about things like avoiding multipurpose tools, which can be hard for people with dementia to identify and navigate. He also prescribes minimizing clutter — including the visual kind. At meal time, that means avoiding patterned plates, which can get confusing, and even serving one food item at a time.

But, mostly, said Clement, it’s about “having giant empathy.” She learned to look at things through her father’s eyes, to recognize what might be strange or confusing to them.

“One day, I went to visit my father and he was so agitated. The nurses couldn’t calm him down. I went into his room and I noticed that across the way there was an ambulance with its light flashing. So I pulled the shade down, and within a couple minutes, he was fine,” she said.

She’s been giving presentations at home shows, senior centers and conferences, and hopes to start offering one-on-one consultations. She wants to prove that accommodations don’t have to be hospital-like, especially in an era when grab bars, for example, can be disguised as stylish towel racks, soap dishes, or toilet-paper holders.

“I think the process of updating your house is absolutely crucial,” she said. And the sooner the better.

“Introducing these things and creating a safe environment in stage one, where they can participate in what happens in the house, is really important.”

February 8, 2017**

On February 8, 2017, the Commission approved a Petition filed by Penichuck East Utility, Inc. (PEU), and Manchester Water Works, Inc. (MWW), for authority to modify their franchise areas to allow MWW to serve three residential lots in Litchfield, New Hampshire, currently served by PEU. The lots are identified on Litchfield Tax Map 23 as Lots 33, 34, and 35. These three lots are not presently served by public water supply.

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) has requested PEU and MWW’s assistance in expanding public water supply in the Town of Litchfield due to the presence of perfluorooctanoic acid (“PFOA”) in the groundwater. The three residential lots on the Litchfield/Manchester line have been identified as having compromised groundwater and are in need of a public water supply. While these three lots are within PEU’s franchise territory, a water main needs to be extended to provide them with service and there is a MWW main that is closer to the lots than PEU’s closest main. Commission Staff reviewed the application and recommended approval of the modification of PEU’s franchise area in the Town of Litchfield to allow MWW to serve the three identified residential lots.

The petition and subsequent docket filings, other than any information for which confidential treatment is requested or granted by the Commission, are posted to the Commission’s website at <http://www.puc.nh.gov/Regulatory/Docketbk/2017/17-003.html>

The Commission found PEU and MWW’s request to modify the boundary between their franchise areas in the Town of Litchfield consistent with the public good, and that the proposal for MWW to charge its tariff rates on file with the Commission is consistent with RSA 362:4, III-a. The Commission delayed the effectiveness of its approval to ensure that the public receives notice of its determination and has an opportunity to request a hearing. All persons interested in responding to the Commission’s action may submit their comments or file a written request for a hearing, which states the reason and basis for a hearing, no later than February 24, 2017. Any person(s) responding to such comments and requests for hearing shall do so no later

than March 3, 2017. Following consideration of any comments and requests for a hearing received, the Commission may further extend the final effective date of its order. The Commission’s approval shall become final and effective on March 9, 2017 unless the Commission orders otherwise.

Consider having the prostate scanned before a biopsy

IN THE 1985 Comedy “Movers & Shakers,” writer Herb Derman (Charles Grodin) gets a checkup from his doctor (Sandy Ward) that leaves the audience wondering just what medical school the guy went to: “Your prostate is boggy,” says the physician.

Turns out that vague description isn’t much more precise than what’s actually touted as the best way to diagnosis prostate cancer. When PSA (prostate-specific antigen) readings are above normal and a digital rectal exam indicates possible prostate changes, the combo often leads to a multi-sample biopsy, a tough procedure, to check for cancerous cells.

Even now, when active surveillance (a PSA test every six months and tracking symptoms) or watchful waiting (less-aggressive tracking) is the smart move, 1 million prostate biopsies are done in the U.S. annually. From that number, only about 161,360 new

cases of prostate cancer are identified.

Since up to 40 percent of those biopsies trigger complications ranging from soreness to infection to acute urinary retention, you’d think there’d be another way to successfully diagnose prostate cancer. There may be, because we’re learning how to minimize diagnostic difficulties.

A new British study offers great news: If men with suspected prostate cancer are given a multiparametric MRI (MP-MRI), doctors can determine who should have a biopsy and who can adopt a watch-and-wait plan. (The scan correctly ID’d 93 percent of aggressive cancers as opposed to

the standard biopsy finding only 48 percent!)

If you’re scheduled for a biopsy, ask your doc about getting the MP-MRI scan first.



Joint Petition to Modify Franchise Boundaries – Litchfield, NH
Summary of Order *Nisi* No. 25,988 Granting Petition
February 8, 2017**
On February 8, 2017, the Commission approved a Petition filed by Pennichuck East Utility, Inc. (PEU), and Manchester Water Works, Inc. (MWW), for authority to modify their franchise areas to allow MWW to serve three residential lots in Litchfield, New Hampshire, currently served by PEU. The lots are identified on Litchfield Tax Map 23 as Lots 33, 34, and 35. These three lots are not presently served by public water supply.
The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) has requested PEU and MWW's assistance in expanding public water supply in the Town of Litchfield due to the presence of perfluorooctanoic acid ("PFOA") in the groundwater. The three residential lots on the Litchfield/Manchester line have been identified as having compromised groundwater and are in need of a public water supply. While these three lots are within PEU's franchise territory, a water main needs to be extended to provide them with service and there is a MWW main that is closer to the lots than PEU's closest main. Commission Staff reviewed the application and recommended approval of the modification of PEU's franchise area in the Town of Litchfield to allow MWW to serve the three identified residential lots.
The petition and subsequent docket filings, other than any information for which confidential treatment is requested or granted by the Commission, are posted to the Commission's website at <http://www.puc.nh.gov/Regulatory/Docketbk/2017/17-003.html>
The Commission found PEU and MWW's request to modify the boundary between their franchise areas in the Town of Litchfield consistent with the public good, and that the proposal for MWW to charge its tariff rates on file with the Commission is consistent with RSA 362:4, III-a. The Commission delayed the effectiveness of its approval to ensure that the public receives notice of its determination and has an opportunity to request a hearing. All persons interested in responding to the Commission's action may submit their comments or file a written request for a hearing, which states the reason and basis for a hearing, no later than February 24, 2017. Any person(s) responding to such comments and requests for hearing shall do so no later than March 3, 2017. Following consideration of any comments and requests for a hearing received, the Commission may further extend the final effective date of its order. The Commission's approval shall become final and effective on March 9, 2017 unless the Commission orders otherwise.




