2	CMSR. GIAIMO: Good afternoon. We're
3	here today in Docket DE 19-133 relative to
4	Public Service Company of New Hampshire's
5	Petition for Preauthorization of the
6	Westmoreland Clean Innovation Project.
7	The Commission has received the
8	Company's Affidavit of Publication. And, to
9	date, we have received Eversource's Petition,
10	the Consumer Advocate's Letter of
11	Participation, and the intervention requests of
12	Clean Energy New Hampshire and Sunrun.
13	Are there any preliminary matters we
14	need to deal with?
15	[No verbal response.]
16	CMSR. GIAIMO: Hearing silence, we'll
17	move to take appearances. Mr. Fossum.
18	MR. FOSSUM: Good afternoon,
19	Commissioners. Matthew Fossum, here for Public
20	Service Company of New Hampshire, doing
21	business as Eversource Energy.
22	CMSR. GIAIMO: Thank you.
23	Ms. Mineau.
24	MS. MINEAU: Madeleine Mineau, for

1 Clean Energy New Hampshire. CMSR. GIAIMO: Thank you. 2 3 MR. KREIS: I quess it's my turn. I'm D. Maurice Kreis, the Consumer Advocate, 4 5 here on behalf of residential utility customers 6 pursuant to RSA 363:28. And with me today is 7 Jim Brennan and Pradip Chattopadhyay, my 8 excellent team of analysts. 9 CMSR. GIAIMO: Thank you. And 10 congratulations. 11 MR. KREIS: Thank you. 12 MR. BUCKLEY: Good afternoon, 13 Commissioners Bailey and Giaimo. My name is 14 Brian D. Buckley. I'm a Staff Attorney with 15 the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission. 16 And, here with me today, representing the 17 Staff's Electric Division are Mr. Richard 18 Chagnon, Mr. Kurt Demmer, Mr. Jay Dudley, and 19 Ms. Elizabeth Nixon. 20 CMSR. GIAIMO: Thank you. So, are 21 there any objections to the motions to 22 intervene? 23 MR. FOSSUM: None. 24 Seeing none, we'll CMSR. GIAIMO:

1	grant those motions.
2	(Cmsr. Giaimo and Cmsr. Bailey
3	conferring.)
4	CMSR. GIAIMO: So, it has been
5	brought to my attention that Attorney Birchard
6	is not here, and neither is anyone from Sunrun,
7	looking around the room. That doesn't change
8	your positions? It's still the same?
9	MR. FOSSUM: No objection.
10	CMSR. GIAIMO: All right.
11	(Cmsr. Giaimo and Cmsr. Bailey
12	conferring.)
13	CMSR. GIAIMO: Commissioner Bailey
14	and I have discussed this. And we think it is
15	prudent to accept Ms. Mineau's request for
16	intervention, and we'll keep the Sunrun
17	intervention request under advisement.
18	Let's start with initial positions.
19	MR. FOSSUM: Thank you,
20	Commissioners, and good afternoon.
21	The Company is here today and is
22	pleased to present today this Westmoreland
23	Clean Innovation Project, and we'll highlight a
24	few issues of it this afternoon.

We believe this is an innovative proposal for New Hampshire. It incorporates a number of proposals that, taken as a whole, both address reliability needs in the Westmoreland area and presents savings for customers.

As described in the testimony that we have filed, it's a three-part proposal; including targeted energy efficiency and a "bring-your-own-device" proposal for customers to use their own customer-sited devices. The combination of the targeted energy efficiency and the "bring-your-own-device" proposal work together to help control both the size and the cost of the third part of this proposal, the utility-scale battery.

Taken as a group, these proposals address a real and persistent reliability need in the Westmoreland area that would otherwise be addressed through a traditional poles-and-wires solution, and it will do so at a cost lower than a traditional wires-and-poles solution. We believe this proposal presents the better course both for Westmoreland and,

hopefully, over the long term, for the state.

From some initial feedback we have received, we understand there may some question about the underlying reliability issue. It is a real, genuine, and continuing issue in that area, and we are prepared to address questions that may arise about it.

We understand there may also be some questions about the benefits as calculated by the Company in this case. Those benefits we believe are fair and appropriate. And we're prepared to validate those for the Commission and the parties.

This is an important and an innovative proposal the Company is proud to present. And we're pleased to work with the others, the other parties to this case, to resolve their concerns and move this matter forward. And we ask that the Commission approve our proposal.

CMSR. BAILEY: Mr. Fossum, do you

know if the proposal includes a new form of metering?

MR. FOSSUM: I don't believe it -from what is in the testimony, no. We are not,
at this point, proposing to change or bring in
new forms of customer metering, no.

CMSR. BAILEY: Okay. To the extent that the meters have the ability to control the discharge of electricity upon your -- the Company's call, I ask that you pay careful attention to cybersecurity, and inform the Commission about what the Company has done to ensure that cybersecurity issues are addressed.

MR. FOSSUM: Absolutely.

Cybersecurity is of paramount concern to the Company. We are not, to the extent that there is going to be things like load reductions, essentially at the call of the Company, those would not be through Company meters.

But, regardless of how they happen, we are dedicated to ensuring the safety and integrity both of our system and of customer information. And we will certainly update the Commission, as necessary, with any of that

1 information. CMSR. BAILEY: 2 Thank you. 3 CMSR. GIAIMO: Thank you. 4 Ms. Mineau. 5 MS. MINEAU: Thank you. 6 As advocating for clean energy 7 innovation is a central part of our mission, 8 we're very interested in this docket and the 9 proposal that Eversource has brought forward. 10 But we don't wish to take a position at this 11 time. 12 CMSR. GIAIMO: Thank you. Mr. Kreis. 13 MR. KREIS: Thank you, Commissioner 14 Giaimo. 15 I went on record some time ago as 16 referring to this project and the Company's 17 proposal for a micro grid in Portsmouth, when 18 filed in the Company's rate case, as a couple 19 of "glitter bombs". And the Company was quite 20 responsive to that expression of a concern, and 21 agreed to move this project and the micro grid 22 project out of the rate case and into 23 freestanding dockets. 24 Here, in this context of the

freestanding docket, a cynic might say that the BYOD and energy efficiency portions of the Company's proposal are glitter bombs within the bigger glitter bomb, because they surely don't really have any impact on whether or not to green light a \$6 million investment in a big battery.

So, at its heart, this is really a docket about "whether it is good public policy and consistent with the statutory requirements to allow Eversource to make a major investment in utility-scale batteries?" And the answer to that question, from my standpoint, is "maybe".

I heard Mr. Fossum say that

Eversource intends to address concerns about

the claimed benefits of the project and about

the reliability implications. And I'm willing

to say that, if the Company can address all of

those concerns, and make a credible case that

this is a project that should move forward,

even though the Commission's approval,

preapproval for most investments are not

required, I think preapproval would be

appropriate here. And we are willing to listen

to the Company's proposal to talk about it, to conduct discovery with an open mind. And we reserve judgment about whether it is in the best interests of the Company's residential customers.

CMSR. GIAIMO: Mr. Buckley.

MR. BUCKLEY: Thank you, Commissioner Giaimo.

Staff is still evaluating the issues presented by the Company in the instant petition, including, but not limited to, those relating to how the avoided back tie is accounted for in the Company's cost/benefit analysis; how that same cost/benefit analysis considers round trip efficiency of the proposed battery storage investments for the purposes of RSA 374-G; issues relating to customer privacy and cybersecurity; and the prudence of the targeted investments in energy efficiency and demand response, and how those investments relate to the rest of the project described in the Company's petition.

That said, we look forward to working with the Company to answer our initial

questions on these and other issues in the 1 technical session that follows today's 2 3 prehearing conference. Thank you. 4 5 CMSR. GIAIMO: Thank you, Mr. 6 Buckley. 7 Are there any -- is there any additional business we need to take care of 8 before the technical session? 9 10 [No verbal response.] CMSR. GIAIMO: All right. Seeing 11 12 none, we'll leave you to the technical session. Have a great weekend. We have under advisement 13 14 the intervention, which we'll take care of as 15 soon as we can. Thank you. 16 (Whereupon the prehearing 17 conference was adjourned at 1:19 p.m., and a technical 18 19 session was held thereafter.) 20 21 22 23 24
